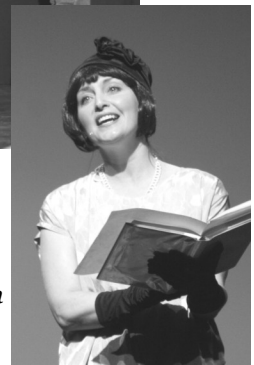

Recycling at the Cokeville Landfill

The landfill is open Tuesday, Wednesday and Saturday from 8-4. Recycling bins are inside. They are for sorted office pack, newspaper, magazines, aluminum cans, tin cans, clear glass and brown glass. Also accepted are household disposal of: e-waste (computers, peripherals & Tv's), used motor oil, used cooking oil (separated from the motor oil!) and lead acid (vehicle) batteries.

We do not recycle plastics because they require a large quantity to make a single bale and we do not have any place to store the plastic. Cardboard is a problem at Cokeville because we do not have a place to store it. If you have a large quantity of cardboard please contact the landfill or call Mary Crosby at 877-2095.

Larry LaFave moved, seconded by Carol Reed to establish quorum and to adopt the agenda with the addition of Item #4 to the New Business section and to approve April 7, 2010, meeting minutes as presented; motion carried.

Clara Dayton presented Chamber of Commerce Treasurer's Report; motion to accept treasurer's report by Charles Dayton, seconded by Carol Reed – motion carried.

Charles Dayton introduced Jeremy Oswald, Parks and Recreation Summer Intern.

OLD BUSINESS:

Ongoing Projects Update – Harry Staven reported on ongoing projects. Stewart Petersen asked Harry to get a contact number for the State Historical Preservation Architectural Program so that the Historical society could ask when the architectural evaluation project is going to be completed.

Centennial Celebration Banner – Dan Richardson

informed the membership that he will coordinate the hanging of the Centennial Banner prior to May 10th when the main celebration event takes place.

Centennial Celebration Events Update – Carol Reed outlined the upcoming Centennial events.

Centennial T-Shirts – Carol Reed reported that multiple families have signed up to display their name and brand information on the Centennial t-shirts; a retail price of \$15.00 was set for the t-shirts – Carol to place an order for 200 t-shirts.

FY2010-11 Chamber Budget Request to Lincoln County – Harry Staven briefed membership on the \$4,000.00 FY2010-11 budget request to Lincoln County; Harry will make the presentation to County Commissioners at 5:15 p.m. on Thursday, May 6th – membership asked Harry to coordinate a similar budget request to Town of Clayton.

Parks and Recreation Summer Intern Budget Request – Charles Dayton asked for \$ 500.00 budget to cover 1/3 of the Summer Intern expenses; Carol Reed moved, seconded by Larry LaFave to pay \$500.00 to Jeremy Oswald on May 15th – motion carried. Harry Steven pointed out that the payment is to cover living expenses and not a payroll item.

The Sign Grant – Carol Reed moved, seconded by Larry LaFave to authorize Harry Staven to submit a proposal for the Sign Grant to cover the remaining costs associated with the Cokeville

Welcome Sign.

The Cultural Trust Fund Grant – item was tabled to June meeting.

TEAL Grant – item was tabled to June meeting.

FY2010-11 Chamber Budget Request to Town of Cokeville- Carol Reed moved, seconded by Larry LaFave to make Chamber of Commerce FY 2010-11 budget request to town of Cokeville in the amount of \$5,000.00; motion carries. "Cokeville Register" Editor – Harry Staven reported that Shelly Gailey is willing to continue to be the Cokeville Register Editor after she relocates to Idaho, if a replacement is not found; discussion followed and membership determined that Jeremy Oswald should take over in the capacity of an Interim Editor after Shelly Gailey leaves.

CEDC Organizational Issues – Chairman Petersen opened the floor for CEDC Board of Director nominations. Stewart Petersen, Chairman; Charles Dayton, Vice-Chairman; Carol Reed, Secretary; Clara Dayton, Treasurer and Harry Staven, General Manager were voted to serve on the CEDC Executive Board and Board of Directors.

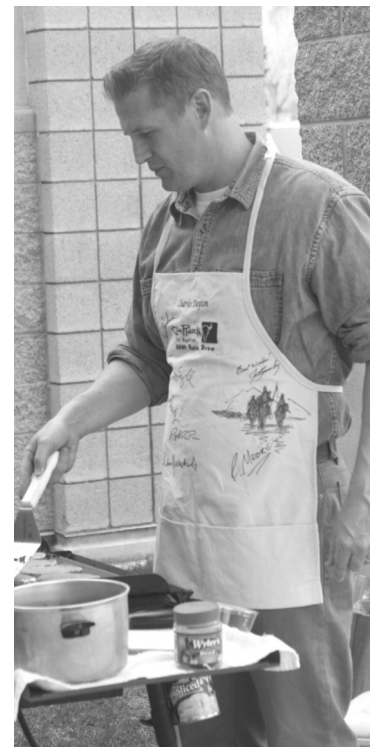
Stewart Petersen informed membership that Paul Woody has expressed interest to open a mechanic shop/towing service in Cokeville.

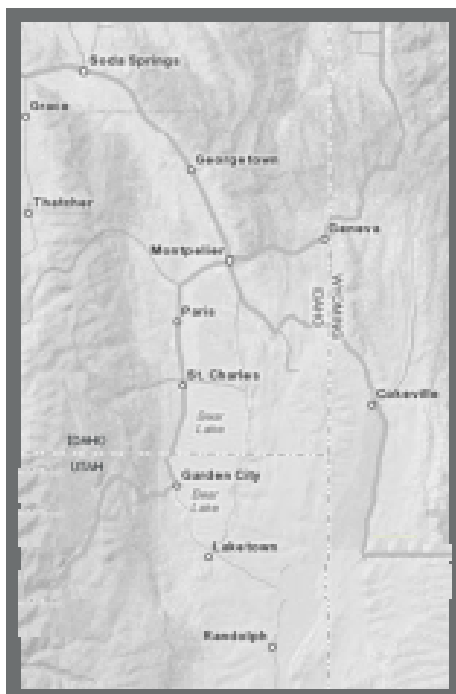

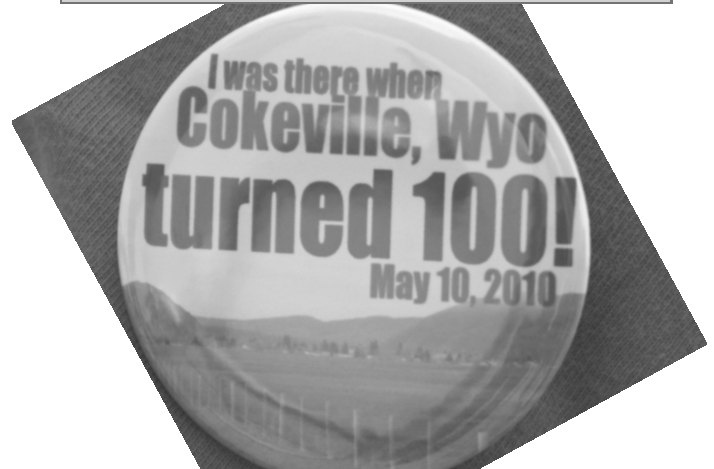

 Blondie's Diner, located on Hwy 30, south of the Baptist Church, is nearing completion. A tentative date of May 24th has been set for opening. Hours of operation will be Monday thru Saturday 7 a.m.—9 p.m. and Sunday 10 a.m.—6 p.m. Breakfast will be served until 11 am. Menu items will include a traditional breakfast selection, shakes, burgers (including an eight-ounce "Blondie Burger" with toppings such as Swiss and mushrooms, or cheese and bacon), hand cut French fries, Navaho tacos with homemade chili, and hand cut ribeye steaks, just to name a few. Management noted that they are open to menu ideas— if

there is something you would like to see included, let them know and they will see if they can make it work. (I, for one, hope mozzarella sticks are on the menu.)
 A few additional items worth mentioning: Blondie's Diner will be a non-smoking facility. For now, they are fully staffed, but will be happy to take applications to keep on file for future openings.
